

Removal of Swine from the Isle of Man into Great Britain.

The Order of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries known as "The Swine Fever (Movement from Isle of Man) Order of 1909" has been revoked as from 1st April, 1912, by "The Swine Fever (Movement from Isle of Man) Order of 1912."

Under this Order of 1912, Swine marked for slaughter and consigned from the Isle of Man to any bacon factory, slaughter house, lairs, market, or sale-yard in a Scheduled Area in Great Britain, can only be removed from the Island under a Licence authorising such removal. (Form 2a).

Application for a Licence must be made on Form No. 1a.

The Licence will be issued by either the Chief Constable, Superintendent of Police, or the Inspector of Police at Ramsey, Peel, or Castletown, who are the Officers appointed to issue such Licences.

Swine not marked for slaughter can, under the Order of 1912, be removed from the Isle of Man into Great Britain only on a Licence authorising such movement to be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in Great Britain in which is situate the place of destination specified in the Licence.

Before such Licence can be issued a declaration must be made on Form 3a, which must be countersigned by either the Chief Constable, Superintendent of Police, or the Inspector of Police at Ramsey, Peel, or Castletown. This declaration must be sent by the person desiring to remove the Swine to the Inspector of the Local Authority of the district in which the place of destination of the pigs is situate.

The Insular officer of police, countersigning the declaration, will retain the counterfoil attached to the foot of the declaration.
