



The attention of Agriculturists and others concerned is drawn to an Order made by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, under the provisions of the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, and dated March 5th, 1912.

The Order requires the possessor of any animal which is labouring under, or which has any symptom of any of the following diseases, to give immediate notification of the fact to the nearest Police Station :—

1. Anthrax.
2. Cattle-plague.
3. Foot-and-Mouth disease.
4. Glanders and Farcy.
5. Rabies.
6. Epizootic lymphangitis.
7. Parasitic mange (sarcoptic and psoroptic mange).
8. Pleuro-pneumonia.
9. Sheep-pox.
10. Sheep scab.
11. Swine fever.

The term "animal" includes horse, gelding, mare, foal, bull, cow, mule, ass, ox, heifer, steer, calf, sheep, tup, wether, lamb, pig, hog, sow, and goat.

Failure to notify renders the defaulter liable to a penalty of £20.
