



STORAGE OF PETROLEUM.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor has issued an Order under the Dangerous Goods Acts modifying the Regulations of the 12th May, 1882, so far as they relate to the keeping and storage of Petroleum with a flash-point of over 73 degrees Fahrenheit (lamp oil, &c.)

Persons storing less than 40 gallons of such Petroleum require no licence. Persons storing between 40 and 120 gallons will, under the new Order, still require a licence, but the Regulations of the 12th May, 1882, as regards keeping and storage will not extend to their premises. Persons storing over 120 gallons will also still require a licence, and their premises must conform to the Regulations of the 12th May, 1882.

THE DANGEROUS GOODS ACTS, 1871 AND 1881.

Orders respecting the Storage of Petroleum.

WHEREAS, by the Dangerous Goods Acts, 1871 and 1881, the Governor is empowered in certain cases to grant licences for the keeping or storing of Dangerous Goods (which term includes Petroleum) and to make regulations in connection therewith:

And whereas, by section 3 of the General Orders respecting the storing of Dangerous Goods made by the Lieutenant-Governor on the 12th day of May, 1882, certain regulations are made with respect to licensed premises in which Petroleum shall be deposited, stored, warehoused, or kept:

And whereas it is considered desirable to exempt from the operation of such last-mentioned regulations licensed premises in which is kept or stored Petroleum not exceeding at any one time one hundred and twenty (120) gallons, and which gives off an inflammable vapour at a temperature exceeding seventy-three degrees of Fahrenheit's thermometer.

It is, therefore, hereby ordered as follows:—

1. Section 3 of the said General Orders of the 12th day of May, 1882, shall not apply to any premises licensed under the said Dangerous Goods Acts in which is kept or stored Petroleum not exceeding at any one time one hundred and twenty (120) gallons, and which, when tested in the manner set forth in the Dangerous Goods Act, 1881, gives off an inflammable vapour at a temperature of more than seventy-three degrees of Fahrenheit's thermometer.
2. This Order shall, until further Order to the contrary, apply to every person to whom hereafter a licence for the storage of Petroleum shall be granted under the said Dangerous Goods Acts, and shall be incorporated with such licence, so far as the same may be applicable thereto, and shall apply to the person licensed in so far as the same shall be applicable to him, and shall form part of such licence and be construed together therewith as forming one licence.
