



Examinations for Admission to the Manx Bar.

Students at Law have to pass three examinations for admission to the Manx Bar: the First or Preliminary Examination ^{before being articled} ~~within the first year~~, and the Second or Intermediate Examination, within the first three years of being articled. The Final Examination is at the termination of the five years for which Students are articled clerks.

In the event of failure, two other opportunities for each examination are afforded, at intervals of not less than three nor exceeding four months; but three consecutive failures in any one of the examinations excludes a Student from admission to the Manx Bar.

The Preliminary Examination embraces the following subjects:—

1. English Composition.
2. English History.
3. Geography.
4. Arithmetic.
5. Elementary knowledge of Latin.
6. French, or any other Modern Language.

The Intermediate Examination embraces simple questions on Law, and Book-keeping.

The Final Examination includes questions on—

Common and Statute Law and Practice of the Courts,
Conveyancing,
Equity and Practice of the Courts,
Bankruptcy and Practice of the Courts,
Criminal Law and Proceedings before Magistrates.

The questions are given to each Student in writing. He is examined in a room by himself, after first pledging his honour that he has no books of reference with him. The time allowed for Examination is from eleven a.m. to two p.m., during which time the Student is not allowed to leave the room or to

communicate with anyone except with the consent of the Examiners or of the person authorized by the Governor to take charge of the Examination Papers.

The Examiners submit the result of each Examination to the Government Office, through which Department intimation is made to the Student.

The dates for Examination are fixed from time to time by the Governor.

Applications to attend Examinations must be addressed to the Government Secretary, accompanied by the fee of £1 for the Preliminary Examination, £2 10s. for the Intermediate Examination, and £2 10s. for the Final Examination.
