



REGULATIONS FOR THE TYNWALD COURT 5TH JULY, 1915.

THE Tynwald Court to be held at St. John's on July 5th will be the occasion for promulgating the Acts passed during the last Session, and for transacting other business.

The general arrangements in connection with the ceremony will be as follows :

1. A Service will be held in the Chapel at 11-15 a.m. The Council, Keys, and Clergy will have the use of rooms in the Schoolhouse adjoining the Chapel for robing purposes.

2. The Council and Keys will go in procession from the Schoolhouse to their seats in the Chapel.

3. His Majesty's Chaplains and the Chaplain to the House of Keys will attend in full canonicals. The rest of the Clergy, without exception, will attend in Convocation robes (cap, gown, and hood).

4. A guard of honour, furnished by the Isle of Man Volunteers, will be mounted at Tynwald Hill, on either side of the path leading from the Hill to the Chapel. Two Companies of National Reserves to be detailed by the Commandant of Knockaloe Detention Camp, together with the Band of No. 9 Company 5th Battalion the King's Liverpool Regiment will line either side of the path at the end nearest the Chapel.

5. Detachments of the Isle of Man Boy Scouts, and of certain approved and uniformed Boys' Brigades, will be allowed to be present, and will occupy the intervening ground on either side of the path. Application to be present must be made to the Government Secretary by the Commandants of these Corps on or before 26th June, 1915.

6. The public will not be permitted to proceed within the lines formed by the Troops, the Boy Scouts, and the Boys' Brigades.

7. The Council, Keys, Clergy, High-Bailiffs, Captains of Parishes, and Coroners will occupy the same places in the Chapel which were respectively allotted to them on July 6th, 1914.

8. Two places for friends will be reserved in the Chapel for each of the members of the Council and Keys, for the Government Secretary, the High-

Bailiffs, the Chief-Constable, the Secretary of the House of Keys, and other officials. Tickets will be issued to the above-named in due course: they will be numbered, and coloured blue. The numbers on the tickets will correspond with numbers on the pews.

9. There will be limited accommodation in the Chapel for members of the public, and application to be present must be made in writing, addressed to the Government Secretary, Government Office, Douglas, before June 26th. The tickets, which will be limited to two per applicant, will be issued in order of priority of application, and will be white and numbered. The numbers on the tickets will correspond with the numbers on the pews.

10. Ticket-holders must be in their places in the Chapel before 11 a.m.

11. On the conclusion of the Service, a Procession to Tynwald Hill will be formed in the following order:—

Four Sergeants of the Isle of Man Constabulary
 The Coroners.
 The Captains of the Parishes.
 The Clergy.
 The Mayor of Douglas.
 The High-Bailiffs.
 The Chaplain of the House of Keys.
 The Secretary of the House of Keys.
 The Members of the House of Keys.
 The Speaker of the House of Keys.
 Two Messengers of the House of Keys.
 The Government Secretary.
 The Members of the Council.
 The Lord Bishop.
 The Sword-Bearer.
 His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor.
 The Aides-de-Camp to His Excellency.
 The Chief-Constable.
 The Surgeon to the Household.
 His Majesty's Chaplains
 A detachment of the Isle of Man Constabulary.

Before the Procession reaches the guard of honour, it will halt and take up an alignment on either side of the path, facing inwards, so as to enable His Excellency to pass through and be the first to step on to the Hill. The procession will re-form behind His Excellency, in reverse order to that in which it left the Chapel. On the approach of His Excellency, the Troops will "present arms," and the bands will play the National Anthem.

All persons in possession of tickets for the Chapel will be provided with special accommodation in an enclosure at Tynwald Hill. They must not leave their seats in the Chapel until the Procession has left the building, when they will be asked to leave, pew by pew, commencing from the front.

12. On Tynwald Hill, only His Excellency, the members of the Council, the Government Secretary, the Sword-Bearer, and the officers in personal attendance on His Excellency will occupy the top. The Speaker, Members, and Secretary of the House of Keys, together with their Chaplain, will be accommodated on the next step; while the High-Bailiffs, the Mayor of Douglas, and the Clergy (including His Majesty's Chaplains) will occupy the step below.

The lowest step will be kept quite clear.

The Captains of Parishes will stand on either side of the steps, in front of the Hill.

13. After the business has been transacted, the Procession will leave the Hill in the same order in which it left the Chapel. On clearing the guard of honour furnished by the Isle of Man Volunteers it will halt and align itself on either side of the path as before, to enable His Excellency to enter the Chapel first.

14. On the conclusion of the whole Ceremony, after the members of the Council have left the Chapel, persons in the nave are to remain seated until those in the south transept have passed out.

15. Two Police Sergeants will act as Marshals to ensure that the foregoing regulations are strictly observed.
