



Restrictions on the Cruising of Yachts and Pleasure Boats.

THE Naval Authorities have decided that the original restrictions with regard to yachts and pleasure boats imposed by the Order of the 25th May, 1915, made under the Defence of the Realm Act, must be adhered to. The instructions contained in Government Circular, No. 138, must therefore be strictly complied with.

- (1) Duly registered fishing boats engaged solely in fishing and not used for carrying persons for pleasure may proceed to sea from any Port in the Island.
- (2) Boats employed in the service of the Government, the Harbour Commissioners, the Lighthouse Commissioners, or in Pilotage, may proceed to sea from any Port as usual.
- (3) Yachts and pleasure boats may only proceed to sea from the Ports of Douglas, Ramsey, and Peel, and must be in possession of a licence for the purpose, and may only proceed for a distance of two miles from the Pier Head. Applications for licences must be made in writing, addressed to the Government Secretary, Government Office, Douglas, and must give full particulars as to the boat and her ownership.
