Whereas Section 1 of the Profiteering Act, 1919, provides that the Act may be applied by Order of the Lieutenant-Governor to any article or class of articles declared by the Order to be one or one of a kind in common use by the public or being material, machinery or accessories used in the production of such articles, but that the Act shall not apply to any articles which are from time to time declared to be controlled articles.

Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor do hereby declare that the articles or class of articles set out in the Schedules annexed hereto are articles of a kind in common use by the public, and are articles which are not controlled, and do hereby order that the Profiteering Act, 1919, shall apply to each and every article or class of articles contained in the First, Third and Fourth Schedules to this Order and to each article of food specifically mentioned in the Second Schedule hereto.

This Order shall come into force forthwith, and may be cited as the Profiteering Act, 1919, Order (No. 1).
