



ISLE OF MAN (CUSTOMS) ACT, 1919.

Regulations as to Imperial Preference.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR has, in pursuance of Section 8 of the Finance Act, 1919, as applied to the Isle of Man by Section 5 (2) of the Isle of Man Customs Act, 1919, made Regulations, a copy of which is appended, dated the 4th August, 1920, dealing with the proportion of dutiable material used in the manufacture of tobacco which is shown to have been grown or produced in the British Empire, and imported into the Isle of Man.

IMPERIAL PREFERENCE.

Order relating to Tobacco.

In pursuance of Section 8 of the Finance Act, 1919, as applied to the Isle of Man by Section 5 (2) of the Isle of Man Customs Act, 1919, the Lieutenant-Governor of the Isle of Man, being satisfied that Manufactured Tobacco is to a considerable extent manufactured in the British Empire from material not wholly grown or produced within the Empire, hereby orders that the preferential rates of Customs duty shall, in the case of Manufactured Tobacco, be charged only in respect of such proportion of this article as corresponds to the proportion of dutiable material used in its manufacture which is shown to have been grown or produced in the Empire.
