



Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order, 1922.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR has issued an Order under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, dated the 7th February, 1922 (a copy of which is appended), prohibiting the movement of animals should a case of Foot-and-Mouth Disease appear in this Island.

ORDER OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.

FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (CONTROL OF MOVEMENT) ORDER, 1922.

WHEREAS the disease known as Foot-and-Mouth Disease has broken out amongst animals in various parts of Great Britain, AND WHEREAS it is desirable that steps should be taken for the purpose of preventing the introduction and spread of the disease to and in this Island.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, the Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two members of the Council, and in exercise of the powers conferred by the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, 1865 to 1903, DO HEREBY ORDER that upon an Order being made by the Governor that a case of Foot-and-Mouth Disease has appeared, or is apprehended to have appeared, in this Isle, the following regulations shall thereupon take immediate effect:—

1. The area within a radius of two miles from the site of the outbreak of the disease shall be a prohibited area, and the movement of all animals, hay, straw, fodder, agricultural implements, harness, manure, and other articles used in agriculture within such area is strictly prohibited, unless and until permitted by licence issued by the Government Secretary, or an Officer acting on his behalf.

2. If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly outside a prohibited area, the whole shall be deemed to be within the prohibited area.

3. The movement of all cattle, sheep, goats or swine within this Island (outside a prohibited area), is from the issuing of such Order prohibited, except by licence issued by the Government Secretary, or an Officer acting on his behalf.

4. An Inspector under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts acting under the directions of the Lieutenant-Governor, may issue such instructions to the occupier of land or other premises where cattle, sheep, goats or swine are stored, as may at any time become necessary (including instructions for the slaughter of any animal) for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, and the failure by any person to carry out any order or instructions so issued will be deemed an offence against the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts.

5. This Order may be cited as the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order, 1922.
