



The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1929.

EXAMINATION OF ANIMALS FOR EXPORT.

The attention of exporters of livestock from the Isle of Man is drawn to the undermentioned Orders:—

THE TUBERCULOSIS ORDER, 1929.

“Article 14. The importation into the Isle of Man or the exportation from the Isle of Man of an animal which is or appears to be suffering from tuberculosis of the udder, indurated udder, or other chronic disease of the udder, or tuberculous emaciation, or giving tuberculous milk or suffering from a chronic cough and showing definite clinical signs of tuberculosis, is hereby prohibited.”

THE SHEEP SCAB ORDER, 1928.

“Article 10. No sheep shall be exported from this Island unless accompanied by a licence granted by the Inspector. A licence shall only be granted by the Inspector after he has satisfied himself that the sheep are free from all appearance of sheep scab or skin disease.”

Animals for exportation from the Island are required to be properly examined and notice of intention to ship must therefore be given to the Chief Inspector under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, Murray House, Douglas, at least twenty-four hours before the time of shipment, and the Chief Inspector will arrange a time for the examination of the animals.

Where exportation takes place from the port of Douglas, the animals must be assembled in the Government Export Lairs, South Quay, Douglas, at least one hour before the time appointed by the Chief Inspector for examination.

In the case of exportations from the port of Ramsey, the animals must be assembled at Messrs. Chrystal Bros. Mart, Bowring Road, Ramsey, at least one hour before the time appointed by the Chief Inspector for examination.

In the event of the animals being passed for exportation, a veterinary certificate will be handed to the exporter and such certificate must be handed to the master of the vessel on which the animals are being exported from the Island.

In the case of sheep and lambs, an exportation licence will be handed to the exporter in addition to the veterinary certificate and both the licence and the certificate must be handed to the master of the vessel.
