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The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1929.

The Animals (Notification of Disease) Order, 1932.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has issued an Order dated the 20th January, 1932 (a copy of which is appended), under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1929, providing for—

- (1) the notification IN WRITING of disease in any animal or carcase of an animal;
- (2) the isolation of any diseased animal or carcase from other animals; and
- (3) the detention on the premises of a diseased or suspected animal and any animal which has been in the same shed, stable, building, yard or field with the diseased or suspected animal or carcase,

until the animal or carcase affected with or suspected of being affected with disease has been examined by an Inspector under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act.

Under the Order, every person having in his possession or under his charge any animal or carcase affected with or suspected of being affected with disease must immediately give notice in writing of the fact to the nearest Police Station or to an Inspector under the Act.

Supplies of printed forms of notification of disease in animals are available at every Police Station and at the office of the Inspectors under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act in Murray House, Douglas.

“Disease” for the purposes of the Order includes cattle plague or rinderpest, pleuropneumonia, foot and mouth disease, anthrax, glanders and farcy, swine fever, sheep-pox, sheep-scab, rabies, tuberculosis, epizootic lymphangitis, parasitic mange, contagious abortion, ringworm, and any other infectious or contagious disease.

“Animal” for the purposes of the Order includes horses, cattle, sheep, swine and goats.

Failure to comply with the provisions of the Order involves the penalties imposed by the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1929.

The Animals (Notification of Disease) Order, 1932.

BY VIRTUE of the power and authority in me vested by the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1929, I, the said Lieutenant Governor, do hereby order as follows:—

1. Every person having in his possession or under his charge any animal or carcase affected with or suspected of being affected with disease shall immediately give notice in writing of the fact to an Inspector under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1929, or to the nearest Police Station, and it shall be the duty of the Inspector or the Police, as the case may be, forthwith to report such notice to the Government Secretary, Government Office, Isle of Man.

2. The occupier of any premises on which there is an animal or carcase affected with or suspected of being affected with disease shall

(1) prevent access of any animal to the diseased or suspected animal or carcase, or to any part of the premises which has been exposed to infection of disease from the animal or carcase; and

(2) detain on the premises any diseased or suspected animal thereon and any animal which has been in the same shed, stable, building, yard or field with the diseased or suspected animal or carcase;

until the animal or carcase affected with or suspected of being affected with disease has been examined by an Inspector under the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1929.

3. If the owner or person in charge of or having the custody of any animal or carcase affected with or suspected of being affected with disease fails to observe any of the requirements of Articles 1 and 2 hereof, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1929.

4. For the purposes of this Order, the terms used therein shall have the same meanings as in the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1929.

5. This Order may be cited as "The Animals (Notification of Disease) Order, 1932."
