



Customs Duties on Irish Free State Goods Imported into the Isle of Man.

As from the 8th day of November, 1932, until the 28th day of February, 1933, duties of Customs are payable on the importation or removal into the Isle of Man from the Irish Free State, or exported from the Irish Free State to any other country and thence removed into the Isle of Man on the following classes and descriptions of goods.

Live animals for food } a duty of 40 per cent.
Animals not for food } ad valorem.

Poultry and game 30 per cent. ad valorem
Meat, viz: beef, veal, mutton, lamb, pork, ham, and
edible offals not including extracts and essences of
meat, and meat preserved in airtight containers ... 30 per cent. ad valorem.

Irish Free State goods are not now treated as Empire Products but are subject, in addition to the special duties set out above, to the general ad valorem duty and additional duties imposed by the Isle of Man (Customs) Act, 1932, and the Isle of Man (Customs) (No. 2) Act, 1932, as follows :—

Poultry and Game	10 per cent. ad valorem in addition to the 30 per cent. ad valorem duty set out above.
Eggs	10 per cent. ad valorem
Butter	10 do. do.
Lard	10 do. do.
Agricultural Machinery and parts thereof.....	15 do. do.
