



Import Duties (Imperial Preference) No. 1 (Isle of Man) Regulations 1933.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has in pursuance of Section 5 of the Isle of Man (Customs) Act, 1919, and Section 4 and Part 1 of the Second Schedule of the Isle of Man (Customs) Act, 1932, made regulations (a copy of which is appended) in regard to Imperial Preference on goods imported into the Isle of Man.

IMPERIAL PREFERENCE.

WHEREAS the Board of Trade on the 30th January, 1933, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Section 8 of the Finance Act, 1919, and by Paragraph 1 of the Third Schedule to the Import Duties Act, 1932, made Regulations styled the Import Duties (Imperial Preference) No. 1 Regulations 1933, with respect to goods of the classes and descriptions specified in the Schedule to such regulations (in these regulations referred to as "The Schedule").

AND WHEREAS it is desirable that like regulations should be made with respect to this Isle.

NOW, THEREFORE, I the said Lieutenant Governor in pursuance of the powers conferred on me by Section 5 of the Isle of Man (Customs) Act, 1919, and by Section 4 and Part 1 of the Second Schedule of the Isle of Man (Customs) Act, 1932, hereby make the following regulations:—

- (1) These Regulations may be cited as "The Import Duties (Imperial Preference) No. 1 (Isle of Man) Regulations, 1933" and shall come into force on the 28th day of April, 1933.
- (2) Regulation 1 of the Regulations dated the 4th day of August, 1920, made by the Governor under Section 5 of the Isle of Man (Customs) Act, 1919, and Regulation 2 of the Import Duties (Imperial Preference) No. 1 Regulations, 1932, shall have effect as if in those Regulations there were substituted for the words "25 per cent.," the words "50 per cent.," so far as they relate to any class or description of goods set out in the Schedule.
- (3) Where any goods falling within a class or description of goods set out in the Schedule are goods containing a dutiable component which does not fall within a class or description of goods set out in the Schedule Regulation 2 shall also apply in relation to such component as though it were included in the Schedule.
- (4) Where any goods not falling within a class or description of goods set out in the Schedule are goods containing a dutiable component which does fall within such class or description Regulation 2 shall not apply in relation to such component.
- (5) These Regulations shall apply to any goods falling within any class or description of goods set out in the Schedule notwithstanding that for the purpose of any duty of Customs chargeable on the importation thereof such goods are treated as falling within some other class or description of goods not included in the Schedule.
