



# The Food Regulation Act, 1933.

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## REGISTRATION of Retailers of Bread and Meat and Associations of Wholesale and Retail Food Traders &c.

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The attention of those concerned is directed to the following provisions of the Food Regulation Act, 1933, which came into operation on the 5th July, 1933.

- (1). Any person who shall keep or use, or shall suffer to be kept or used, any shop or other premises for public sale by retail of bread or meat, shall cause his name and the nature of his business, and the situation of his premises, to be registered at the Government Office without charge. Every such person shall, within fourteen days after making a change in any of the matters required to be registered, give particulars of such change to the Government Office.

“Bread” means bread made in the manner prescribed by the Bread Flour and Corn Act, 1880, but shall not include French or fancy bread or rolls or cakes.

“Meat” means any portion of the carcase of an animal sold or intended or prepared for sale for consumption as human food, but shall not include any compounded or prepared article of which meat forms a part.

- (2). An Association of persons engaged in the wholesale or retail sale of any article of food or purposes connected with, or relating to, the sale or purchase of such article of food, shall be registered at the Government Office without charge, and shall deposit there a copy of the rules, bye-laws, or regulations of such Association, and the names and addresses of the members, officers, and committee of management of such Association.

Any person who neglects to comply with any provisions of the Act is liable to a penalty of five pounds and in the case of a continuing offence to an additional penalty of one pound per day during which such offence continues.
