



The Defence Regulations (Isle of Man), 1939.

The Sugar Rationing (No. 1) Order, 1940.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has made an Order, a copy of which is appended, entitled "The Sugar Rationing (No. 1) Order, 1940" requiring that sugar shall be rationed in the Isle of Man on and from the 8th day of January, 1940; and accordingly under Article 7 of the Food (Rationing) Order, 1939, from that date, except under instructions from the Lieutenant Governor, persons can only obtain supplies of sugar from the retailers with whom they have registered their sugar rationing coupons, or by means of Emergency Ration Cards or weekly Seaman's Ration Books.

"Sugar" is defined as any sugar which has been subjected to any process rendering it suitable for human consumption, but does not include invert sugar, glucose, molasses, syrup, treacle or manufactured products containing sugar.

The amount of sugar which the holder of a licence to trade under the Food (Rationing) Order, 1939, may supply to a person registered with him or to the holder of an Emergency Card or weekly Seaman's Ration Book shall not exceed twelve ounces per week.

Catering Establishments and Institutions are exempted from the terms of the Order and a further Order will be issued at a later date dealing with supplies of sugar for them.

Officers and men of His Majesty's forces will obtain supplies under special authority.

Failure to comply with the terms of the Order renders a person liable to the penalties imposed by the Defence Regulations.

THE DEFENCE REGULATIONS (ISLE OF MAN) 1939

THE SUGAR RATIONING (No. 1) ORDER, 1940.

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, by virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939, and all other powers me in that behalf enabling, DO hereby Order as follows:

1. Sugar shall be rationed in the Isle of Man on and from the 8th day of January, 1940.
2. On and from the 8th day of January, 1940, the amount of sugar which the holder of a licence to trade under the Food (Rationing) Order, 1939, may supply to a person registered with him under that Order or to a person holding an Emergency Ration Card or a Weekly Seaman's Ration Book shall not exceed twelve ounces per week.
3. This Order shall not apply to the obtaining or supply of sugar for consumption in catering establishments or institutions, or by members of His Majesty's Naval, Military and Air Forces.
4. A person shall not:
 - (a) obtain or supply or attempt to obtain or supply any sugar which he is not entitled so to do by virtue of the terms of this Order or of the Food (Rationing) Order, 1939.
 - (b) obtain or supply or attempt to obtain or supply any sugar by virtue of a coupon registered with a retailer by a person who has left the Isle of Man or has died or is at the time supplied from sugar issued for the general use of the residents in a catering establishment or institution.
5. In this Order

“ Sugar ” means any sugar which has been subjected to any process rendering it suitable for human consumption, but does not include invert sugar, glucose, molasses, syrup, treacle or manufactured products containing sugar.

“ Week ” means the seven days ending at midnight on the 14th day of January, 1940, and each successive period of seven days thereafter.

“ Catering Establishment ” and “ Institution ” have the same meanings as in the Food Control Committees (Registration of Establishments) Order, 1939.
6. This Order may be cited as “ The Sugar Rationing (No. 1) Order, 1940.”
