The Defence (Lighting Restriction) (No. 1) Order, 1940.

SHOP WINDOW LIGHTING.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has, under the powers vested in him by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939 made an Order, a copy of which is appended, re-enacting as from the 12th day of January, 1940, until further Order, the provisions of the Defence (Lighting Restriction) (No. 6) Order, 1939, relating to the permitted lighting in shop windows which was by the No. 6 Order limited to the Christmas season.

Failure to comply with the terms of the Order renders a person liable to the penalties imposed by the Defence Regulations and shopkeepers are warned that offences against the Order will be strictly dealt with.

The Defence (Lighting Restriction) (No. 1) Order, 1940.

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, acting in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939 and all other powers me in that behalf enabling Do hereby Order as follows:

1. Notwithstanding anything contained in article 1 of The Defence (Lighting Restriction) Order, 1939, the internal lighting in the windows of shop premises may be visible from the outside of such windows, subject, however, to the strict observance of the following conditions:—

- (1) No light must be allowed to enter the window from the inside of the shop.
- (2) No mirror or other large reflecting surface may be placed in the window.
- (3) The light may be used only when the shop is open, and it must be turned out immediately the warning siren is sounded.
- (4) The light must be directed from above on to the goods displayed, and no direct light must shine outside the window.
- (5) One lighting fitting or cabinet may be used in each shop window provided that where the shop window is more than 20 feet wide, one fitting or cabinet may be used for each 10 feet width of window, the fittings or cabinets being spaced not less than 10 feet apart.
- (6) The amount of light provided by each lighting fitting for general lighting must not exceed that given by a 25-watt electric lamp in a container finished matt black inside, through a slit not larger than 4 inches by a quarter-inch covered with tissue paper, the bulb being $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches from the slit. In the case of the cabinet the amount of light must not exceed that laid down in specification BS/ARP 35 published by the British Standards Institution, 28, Victoria Street, London, S.W. 1.
- (7) No light other than that in the fitting or cabinet may be used in the window.

2. This Order may be cited as "The Defence (Lighting Restriction) (No. 1) Order, 1940."
