



The Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939. The Aliens Restriction Act, 1922.

The Passenger Traffic Order, 1940.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has, under the powers conferred upon him by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939, and The Aliens Restriction Act, 1922, made an Order (a copy of which is appended) dated the 29th February, 1940, prohibiting the departure from the Isle of Man (except the departure from the Isle of Man direct to Great Britain), of any person unless he or she is in possession of one of the documents named in the Order, WHICH DOCUMENT MUST BEAR AN EXIT PERMIT granted by the Government Secretary or other authorised officer.

The Order applies to British subjects and to Aliens, and comes into operation on the 4th March, 1940.

Persons who desire to leave the Isle of Man for any destination other than Great Britain should apply to any Police Station for a form of application for an Exit Permit which form must be filled up at the Police Station.

The applicant should produce at the Police Station his National Registration Card also two copies of a recent photograph (taken full face without a hat) printed on thin paper, measuring not more than 3 inches by 2 inches and not less than 3 inches by 1½ inches. One of the photographs must be certified by the Police. The form and photographs should then be taken or sent to the Travel Permit Division of Government Office. (Office hours : 10 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. every weekday.)

In the case of British subjects who hold valid passports and in the case of aliens who hold valid passports or Home Office documents of Identity or Police Registration Certificates it will not be necessary for them to produce the two copies of the photograph.

The grant of Exit Permits will lie solely in the discretion of the Government Secretary or other authorised officer who under no circumstances can give reasons for the grant or refusal of a permit.

Applications for Exit Permits should be made by persons desiring them as early as possible as their issue cannot be guaranteed within any specified time, although as little delay as possible will be occasioned in granting them.

Article 2 of the Order sets out the classes of persons who are exempt from the operation of the Order. Crown Servants and Members of the Legislature can obtain special cards of identity from the Travel Permit Division, Government Office.

The Exit Permits must be produced to Immigration Officers or Officers of Police at the Steamers or Aeroplanes by the persons holding them before they embark.

Failure to comply with the terms of the Order renders a person liable to the penalties imposed by the Defence Regulations or the Aliens Restriction Act, 1922.

THE PASSENGER TRAFFIC ORDER, 1940.

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, under the powers conferred upon me by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man), 1939, and the Aliens Restriction Act, 1922, and all other powers in me vested DO HEREBY MAKE THE FOLLOWING ORDER.

1. No person shall proceed from the Isle of Man to any destination outside the Isle of Man except direct to a destination in Great Britain, unless he is in possession of one of the following documents, bearing an Exit permit.
 - (A) For British subjects
 - (a) A valid passport, or
 - (b) A Travel Permit Card, issued by the Government Secretary or other authorised officer, or
 - (c) A Travel Permit card issued by the Authorities in Great Britain, Eire, Northern Ireland or the Channel Isles.
 - (B) For persons who are not British subjects
 - (a) A valid passport or
 - (b) A Home Office Document of Identity, or
 - (c) A Police Registration Certificate.
2. This Order shall not apply to the following categories of persons who produce the necessary credentials
 - (a) Persons in the service of the Crown (including persons in the service of Dominion Governments)
 - (b) Members of the Legislature of the Isle of Man
 - (c) Duly accredited heads of Foreign Diplomatic Missions and members of their official or domestic staff (if not British subjects)
 - (d) Foreign Consuls de Carriere appointed to the United Kingdom
 - (e) Duly accredited officials of allied Governments
 - (f) Police Officers on duty
 - (g) Children under the age of 16 years.
3. This Order will come into operation on the 4th day of March, 1940.
4. This Order may be cited as "The Passenger Traffic Order, 1940."
