



FERTILISERS

ORDERS AND DIRECTION OF THE MINISTER OF SUPPLY.

The Lieutenant Governor wishes to bring to the attention of those concerned with the importation into the Isle of Man and the sale of fertilisers the undermentioned Orders and Direction which have been made by the Minister of Supply under the Defence (General) Regulations, 1939. The first two Orders were previously announced in Government Circulars Nos. 2074 and 2101.

1. **THE CONTROL OF FERTILISERS (No. 1) ORDER, 1939, dated 7th November, 1939.**
2. **THE CONTROL OF FERTILISERS (No. 2) ORDER, 1939, dated 22nd December, 1939.**
3. **THE CONTROL OF FERTILISERS (No. 3) ORDER, 1940, dated 8th January, 1940.**
4. **THE CONTROL OF FERTILISERS (No. 1) ORDER, 1939, DIRECTION No. 3, dated 26th February, 1940.**

The first two Orders provide, inter alia, that superphosphate of lime, ground phosphate and compound fertiliser, except in lots of less than 1 cwt., sold for delivery in the Isle of Man shall be subject to maximum prices calculated on the cash price ruling during the period of four months ending on the 30th June, 1939 (referred to as the "basic price"), and any increase on that price authorised from time to time; and the Direction specifies the amounts by which the basic price may be increased in respect of deliveries made during the months of March, April, May and June, 1940.

The third Order requires the licensing of persons in the United Kingdom who produce fertilisers for disposal or who distribute wholesale, and provides for the registration with these producers and wholesalers of persons who desire to purchase fertilisers for re-sale.
