



The Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939.

The Flour and Bread Order, 1940.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has, under the powers vested in him by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939, made an Order, a copy of which is appended, fixing amended prices for national straight run flour and bread made therefrom, as under :—

- (1) for national straight run flour—27/6d per sack of 280 lbs. wholesale, plus the additions and less the deductions set forth in the Order.
- (2) for bread made from national straight run flour—8½d the four pound loaf.

The Order comes into force on the 7th May, 1940.

Failure to comply with the terms of the Order renders a person liable to the penalties imposed by the Defence Regulations.

THE FLOUR AND BREAD ORDER, 1940.

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, by virtue of the powers vested in me by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939, and all other powers me in that behalf enabling, DO hereby Order as follows :—

P a r t I
FLOUR.

1. "National straight run flour" means flour produced in the United Kingdom or the Isle of Man by running together all the flour streams of a milling plant so as to separate as flour not less than 70% of the total weight of all the products of the milling together with the weight of all screenings, seeds and dust extracted during the process of cleaning the wheat so ground whether or not such screenings are incorporated in wheat by-products or disposed of separately.
2. As from the date hereof all flour milled in the Isle of Man shall be national straight run flour.
3. On the occasion of a sale of national straight run flour the price to be charged by and paid to the seller (hereinafter referred to as "the appropriate price") shall be calculated at the rate of Twenty seven shillings and sixpence per 280 lbs. as in this Order hereinafter provided.
4. The appropriate price shall :
 - (a) where flour is sold net weight in returnable bags be in respect of 280 lbs. net exclusive of the weight of such bags,
 - (b) where flour is in accordance with trade custom sold gross weight in non-returnable bags be in respect of 280 lbs. gross inclusive of the weight of such bags,
 - (c) where flour is sold in non-returnable bags otherwise than gross weight be in respect of 280 lbs. net,
 - (d) include the cost of delivery by the seller to the buyer.
5. Additions shall be made to the appropriate price in accordance with the provisions of Part I of the Schedule to this Order, and deductions shall be made from the appropriate price in accordance with the provisions of Part II of such Schedule.
6. No person shall (a) save as in this Order otherwise provided, sell or agree or offer to sell or invite any offer to buy any national straight run flour at any price other than the appropriate price, or (b) in connection with the sale or disposition of any such flour enter or offer to enter into any fictitious or artificial transactions or make or demand any unreasonable charge.
7. All flour sold shall, save as in this Order otherwise provided, be charged and paid for at the price applicable in accordance with this Order in force at the date of despatch of the flour from mill or store.
8. This Order shall not apply to any sale of less than 280 lbs. of flour.

Part II

BREAD.

- 9. Bread made from national straight run flour shall not be sold in the Isle of Man at a price exceeding Eightpence half-penny the four pound loaf.

REPEAL, CITATION AND OPERATION.

- 10. The Flour and Bread Order, 1939, and the Flour and Bread Order (No. 2) 1939, are hereby revoked, but without prejudice to anything done or suffered under such Orders.
- 11. The Act for shortening the language of Acts of Tynwald, 1865, applies to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Tynwald.
- 12. This Order may be cited as "The Flour and Bread Order, 1940" and shall come into force on the 7th day of May, 1940.

SCHEDULE.

Part I.

Additions which shall be made to the appropriate price.

- 1. Sacks and Bags. (a) Where flour is sold net weight in returnable sacks or bags, the following addition :

Returnable flour bags containing 140 lbs. 2/- per 280 lbs.

(b) Where flour is sold gross weight in non-returnable bags the following addition :

Addition.

Jute bags containing 140 lbs. 1/- per 280 lbs.

(c) Where flour is sold net weight in non-returnable bags, the following addition :

Addition.

Jute bags containing 140 lbs. 1/3 per 280 lbs.

- 2. Interest. Where payment for any flour is not made within 28 days of the date of invoice, interest at the rate of 5% per annum may be added to the appropriate price.

Part II.

Discounts.

Where on a sale of flour payment is made by the buyer within 21 days from the date of invoice, the appropriate price plus the addition thereto mentioned in paragraph 1 (b) of the first Part of this Schedule shall be reduced at a rate in accordance with the following scale :

Payment.

Rate in relation to the Appropriate Price.

Within 7 days from the date of invoice	4d in the £1
Within 8 to 14 days from such date	3d in the £1
Within 15 to 21 days from such date	2d in the £1
