



The Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939.

Closing of Roads on and adjacent to Mooragh Promenade, Ramsey.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has, under the powers vested in him by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939, made an Order, a copy of which is appended, stopping up certain highways and rights of way in the town of Ramsey, being highways and rights of way through or adjoining land appropriated for use in His Majesty's service, such highways and rights of way being coloured red on the plan annexed to the Order, and comprising all highways and rights of way on the Mooragh Promenade and the roadways leading thereto, and the roadway running parallel to the Promenade, alongside the Harbour and the Mooragh Park.

Failure to comply with the terms of the Order renders a person liable to the penalties imposed by the Defence Regulations.

THE DEFENCE REGULATIONS (ISLE OF MAN) 1939. **CONTROL OF HIGHWAYS — MOORAGH, RAMSEY.**

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, in exercise of the powers in me vested under the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939, hereby Direct that the highways or rights of way coloured red on the plan hereto annexed, passing through certain premises on the Mooragh in the town of Ramsey and the parish of Lezayre, appropriated for use in His Majesty's service, or through land adjoining such premises, shall be forthwith stopped up, and DO HEREBY prohibit the exercise of any right of way, or the use of any such highways.

AND I DO HEREBY give authority to Bertram Edward Sargeaunt, Government Secretary, to take all such steps as appear to him to be necessary and expedient in connection with the stopping up of such highways or rights of way.
