



Isle of Man Internment Camps.

ADMINISTRATION SYSTEM.

1. The Commandant is responsible for the registration of all prisoners on arrival at the camp, and a record will be kept of any removals from the camp.
2. Personal records will be kept of each prisoner, including crime and medical history.
3. The Commandant will be responsible for the censorship duties at the Camp. Two censors will be provided.
4. All stores and repairs will be requisitioned from Government Office by the Quartermaster or the Chief Storekeeper.
5. Rations will be issued strictly in accordance with the dietary in force for the time being.
6. Stores will be checked on arrival at the camp by the quartermaster or chief storekeeper, and certified to Government Office as having been received correct, of the quality specified and in good condition.
7. Money belonging to prisoners will be taken from them on arrival at the camp, a ledger account being kept for each prisoner. The Commandant will arrange for the money to be lodged in the Isle of Man Bank. Prisoners will only be allowed to draw upon their accounts to such extent weekly as may be authorised. Not more than 5s. weekly will be allowed for expenditure at the canteen.
8. A canteen will be established and the goods to be sold at the canteen will be supplied by Government Office in accordance with a detailed price list issued from time to time.
9. Clothing for destitute prisoners will be issued in accordance with instructions from Government Office.
10. The Commandant will arrange with the officer commanding the camp guard for the disposition of sentries and for escorts as required.
11. The medical supervision of the camp will be in the hands of the civilian Medical Officer duly appointed.
12. Sick quarters will be provided in two houses, one being utilised as an infectious diseases hospital and the other as a general hospital. Male nurses will be selected by the medical officer from the prisoners, and will be paid such small remuneration as may be authorised from time to time.
13. The prisoners in each house will be required by the Commandant to meet and appoint a committee from among themselves for dealing with the cooking and cleaning of the house. Generally two cooks will suffice for each house and three cleaners. The cooks and cleaners will be paid such small remuneration as cigarette money as may be authorised from time to time. The committees of the several houses may change as they please the personnel for cooking and cleaning duties so that prisoners participate in turn.
14. The house committees will be entirely responsible for the issue and cooking of the food after delivery into the house daily by the orderlies appointed by the committees to receive the daily rations from the quartermaster or chief storekeeper.
15. Any complaints made by a prisoner to the Commandant as to food issued will be referred by the Commandant to the house committee unless there is some special reason for the Commandant intervening.
16. The house committees will also be responsible for the cleanliness of the prisoners and arrangements should be made by the committee so that every prisoner can have a bath at least once a week.
17. The Commandant will ensure that "Blackout" Regulations are complied with.
18. Lights out should normally be 10 p.m., at which hour electricity should be switched off at the main.
