### THE ALIENS RESTRICTION ACT, 1922

## CLOSING OF ROADS --- PORT ERIN

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has, under the powers vested in him by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939, made an Order, a copy of which is appended, stopping up all highways and rights of way leading from the Village District of Port Erin, excepting the Main Road from Port Erin to Douglas.

Persons may only enter or leave Port Erin by the Main Road or by the Isle of Man Railway, and must produce their National Registration Identity Cards to a Police Officer or other authorised officer.

British subjects may only enter Port Erin—(1) if they reside there; or, (2) for business purposes.

Aliens may not leave Port Erin without a Police Permit.

Failure to comply with the terms of the Order renders a person liable to the penalties imposed by the Defence Regulations.

## CONTROL OF HIGHWAYS — PORT ERIN

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, in exercise of the powers vested in me by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939, and the Aliens Restriction Act, 1922, and all other powers me in that behalf enabling DO hereby make the following Order:

1. All highways or rights of way leading from the area comprised within the Village District of Port Erin to other parts of the Island, except the Main Road leading from Port Erin to Douglas, shall be forthwith stopped up and the exercise of any right of way or the use of any such highways, except the aforesaid main road, is hereby prohibited.
2. Persons may only leave or enter Port Erin by the aforesaid main road or by the Isle of Man Railway.
3. Persons entering or leaving Port Erin must produce their National Registration Identity Cards to an officer of Police or other authorised officer.
4. No British subject shall enter Port Erin unless he or she is a resident in that village district or has cause for entering the said district for business purposes.
5. No alien shall proceed out of Port Erin without first having obtained a permit issued under the authority of the Chief Constable.

AND I DO HEREBY give authority to Bertram Edward Sargeaunt, Government Secretary, to take all such steps as appear to him to be necessary and expedient in connection with the stopping up of such highways or rights of way.
