



ISLE OF MAN INTERNMENT CAMPS.

Duties of Works Foremen.

1. A works Foreman will be appointed to take charge of all the buildings, fences, sanitation, etc., of each Internment Camp.
2. The Works Foreman of each Internment Camp will work under the general directions of the Government Surveyor.
3. He will be paid at the rate of £3 15 0 per week if employed in Douglas and District, and £3 10 0 per week outside Douglas and District.
4. He will inspect daily—morning and afternoon—all fences at the Camp to see that they have not been tampered with and, if necessary, take steps to render them secure.
5. He will be responsible for visiting every room in every house daily for the purpose of securing that no damage is being done by the prisoners of war. He will also deal with minor repairs to buildings.
6. Any furniture stored under lock and key in the houses will be in charge of the Works Foreman, and he will inspect it periodically to see that it is not deteriorating through damp, moths or other cause.
7. The Works Foremen will inspect lavatories, bathrooms, etc., in every house daily to see that they are not choked and are working freely, and he will arrange for the execution of any repairs which may be necessary.
8. He will also be in charge of any work which may be carried out in the Camp hereafter.
9. The Works Foreman will be responsible for the prompt removal of all refuse from the houses, and for its removal from the compound by the Local Authority.
10. In the execution of his duties the Works Foreman may engage, with the sanction of the Commandant, four prisoners of war, preferably skilled men, who will be entitled to cigarette money at the rate of 6d. per day when employed, to execute any duties which may be required.
