### **THE ALIENS RESTRICTION ACT, 1922.**

---

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, by virtue of the powers in me vested by the Defence Regulations (Isle of Man) 1939, and the Aliens Restriction Act, 1922, and all other powers in that behalf enabling DO hereby Order that all aliens residing within the village districts of Port Erin and Port St. Mary and that part of the parish of Rushen, hereinafter called "the Camp," enclosed by a fence specially erected shall be subject to the following regulations:—

- (1) All aliens within the Camp shall obey the instructions of a Commandant or other officer duly appointed by me and acting on her behalf.
- (2) All letters written by aliens for posting to places outside the Camp shall be stamped and addressed, but left open, and handed in at the Commandant's office for posting. Letters must be written in English unless by permission in writing of the Commandant they are allowed to be written in another language.
- (3) All money received by aliens shall be paid over to the Commandant, who will take steps to bank it and credit it to the alien's account in the Camp books.
- (4) An alien may not draw against her banking account to an extent exceeding 5/- weekly, except with the express sanction of the Commandant, for some exceptional purpose.
- (5) The Commandant may order any alien who fails to comply with orders given by her to be sent to detention for a period not exceeding seven days, and to be subject to diet "A" as provided for prisoners at the Isle of Man Prison.
- (6) The Police cells at Port Erin and Port St. Mary Police Stations will be used as places of detention.
- (7) The above procedure will be taken with regard to all offences against discipline. Offences which contravene the law will be dealt with by the Commandant handing the offender over to the Police.
