STORES.

The Chief Storekeepers must be careful to see that no furniture or utensils belonging to one house are moved to another house and thus interfere with the inventories of the respective houses.

With regard to blankets, pillows and towels, there is no objection to these being pooled and distributed to the houses in the Camp as required. Jars and tins, suitable for use as containers for dry groceries, jam, etc., may be dealt with in the same way.

Any expensive china not removed by the former occupier must be placed in the storerooms of the house. Surplus stocks of cutlery and crockery in any house must be kept under lock and key and only issued as required.

Only two blankets and one towel should be issued to each prisoner. Any surplus should be kept in store and issued as deficiencies arise on account of wear and tear.
