THE COAL (MAXIMUM PRICES) ORDER, 1950

In consequence of the increased freight charges on coal, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has made the above-styled Order, the effect of which is to increase the maximum prices which may be charged for coal throughout the Island. The maximum permitted prices now are:—

	When sold in quantities not exceeding 9 cwts. At a rate not exceeding per cwt.	When sold in quantities exceeding 9 cwts. At a rate not exceeding per ton.

Nuts (Mains Trebles)	5s. 7½d.	£5 10s. 8d.
Kitchen (or Seconds) Coal

SUPPLIES AND SERVICES.

THE COAL (MAXIMUM PRICES) ORDER, 1950.

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, by virtue of the powers vested in me by Regulations 55 and 98 of the Defence (General) Regulations (Isle of Man), 1939, as having effect by virtue of the Supplies and Services (Transitional Powers) (Isle of Man) Order, in Council, 1946, as extended by the Supplies and Services (Extended Purposes) (Isle of Man) Order in Council, 1948, do hereby Order as follows:—

1.—No person shall sell or buy any coal at a price exceeding the maximum price applicable in accordance with the provisions of the Schedule to this Order.

2.—No person shall in connection with the sale or disposition or proposed sale or disposition of any coal enter or offer to enter into any artificial transaction or make or demand any unreasonable charge.

3.—The Coal (Maximum Prices) (No. 2) Order, 1949, is hereby revoked, but such revocation shall not affect anything done or omitted to be done under such revoked order or any penalty or forfeiture incurred thereunder.

4.—In this Order—

“buy” includes offer, agree or attempt to buy, and “sell” includes offer, agree or attempt to sell or expose for sale;

“coal” has the same meaning as in the Coal Control Order (No. 3) 1948.

5.—This Order may be cited as the Coal (Maximum Prices) Order, 1950, and shall come into force on the 26th day of May, 1950.
