## The Isle of Man Police Regulations, 1961

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, by virtue of the powers me in that behalf enabling do hereby make the following Regulations:—

1. At the end of paragraph (6) of Regulation 16 of the Isle of Man Police Regulations, 1953, as set out in the Isle of Man Police Regulations (No. 2) 1956, and amended by the Isle of Man Police Regulations, 1957 (which relates to time off or an allowance in lieu thereof in respect of duty on a public holiday or rest day) there shall be added the following sub-paragraph:—

“ (h) where a member is required to do duty on a public holiday or on a day which would otherwise have been a rest day (otherwise than when he is recalled to duty after completing a tour of duty), his period of duty shall include the time occupied by him in going to and returning from his place of duty not exceeding such reasonable limit as may be fixed by the Chief Constable, save that any period of time so occupied which together with the member's period of duty amounts to more than four hours shall be disregarded.”

2. (1) These Regulations may be cited as the Isle of Man Police Regulations, 1961.
- (2) These Regulations shall be deemed to have come into operation on the fifteenth day of September, 1960.

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### Explanatory Note

(This Note is not part of the Regulations, but is intended to indicate their general purport.)

These Regulations amend the Isle of Man Police Regulations, 1953, by enabling a police officer who does duty on a public holiday, or on a rest day, to include in his period of duty the time taken in travelling to and from his place of duty (in so far as the time taken and the period of duty do not exceed four hours) for the purpose of calculating his time off or the allowance in lieu.
