REMUNERATION OF THE LAND COURT.

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, in pursuance of the powers conferred on me by paragraph 6 of the Second Schedule to the Agricultural Holdings Act, 1969, and all other powers me in that behalf enabling, DO HEREBY PRESCRIBE the following Scale of Remuneration of the Land Court constituted under the said Act:-

To the Chairman and each Member of the Land Court other than a Deemster, the Attorney General, the High Bailiff or person to whom the provisions of the Isle of Man Civil Service Act 1962 apply, payment at the rate of £3 per day for each day or part of a day during which he was engaged at the hearing of a question determinable by such Court.
