THE CUSTOMS (IMPORT DEPOSITS) SCHEME, 1969

THE CUSTOMS (IMPORT DEPOSITS) (TERMINATION) ORDER, 1970

I, the said Lieutenant Governor, by virtue of the powers conferred on me by paragraph 5(2) of the Customs (Import Deposits) Scheme, 1969, as amended by sub-paragraph (1) of paragraph 1 of the Customs (Import Deposits) (No. 2) Scheme, 1969, and all other powers enabling me in that behalf DO hereby make the following Order:

1. (1) This Order may be cited as the Customs (Import Deposits) (Termination) Order, 1970.
- (2) The Interpretation Act, 1970, shall apply for the interpretation of this Order as it applies for the interpretation of an Act of Tynwald.
- (3) This Order shall have effect from the date hereof.
2. Duty under paragraph 1 of the Customs (Import Deposits) Scheme, 1969, as amended by the Customs (Import Deposits) (No. 2) Scheme, 1969, the Customs (Import Deposits) Scheme, 1970, and the Customs (Import Deposits) (No. 2) Scheme, 1970, shall cease to be in force with effect from 5th December, 1970.

Explanatory Note

(This note is not part of the Order)

This Order provides that imported goods entered with the customs on or after 5th December, 1970, will not be charged with the duty of customs known as an import deposit.
